A Message from Pastor Mathew

I'm a big fan of short one-liner jokes, dad jokes, and even anti-jokes. Their humor isn't something you have to go searching for. Yet, we're so used to getting out the theoretical map and flashlight to look for a punchline that it can easily be missed. What's blue and smells like red paint? Well, it's blue paint. Or, what's brown and sticky? Now, before you stick your head in the gutter, I'll tell you the answer is a stick. See what I mean? The fact that they don't carry your mind off on a sea of words or misdirection is where the humor comes from. It's so simple, it just makes you chortle a little bit. Let us keep in mind that the world requires many things of us and has trained us to go looking with maps and flashlights for all that will fulfill them. But, the Gospel of Jesus isn't hidden in a sea of words or misdirection. The punchline is staring us in the face and it is Jesus and him crucified; period. Pure grace that brings a smile to our face.

Heath and Safety Committee By Curt Neill

In 2018 Allegheny County Department of Emergency Services conducted an All-Hazards Assessment of the interior and exterior church campus. Several safety-related recommendations were presented to the COE for review which lead to the formation of an Ad hoc Safety Committee. This committee began meeting in March 2019.

As COVID-19 presented in 2020, this committee collaborated with the COE and Pastor to create a safe means of worshipping and supporting ministries in spite of pandemic restrictions and limitations. At the January 2021 Annual Meeting, the congregation voted to appoint the Safety Committee as an ongoing vestry committee.

The Committee goal is to promote the health and safety of our church members through education, training, and Christian vigilance. The committee is principally comprised of the members who have experience in healthcare, building and property safety, security, law enforcement and/or state and federal grant writing. The chairperson is appointed annually by the COE. Some committee activities are: (1) Preparing Zion for unexpected emergencies and incidents, (2) Assisting with general safety measure and accident prevention awareness, and (3) Coordinating training programs for staff, the congregation and the surrounding community.
