# A Message from Pastor Mathew


Dead is dead. But, is it? As we move into the midst of the Easter season, we are constantly reminded that while dead is dead, it wasn't for one man. On the day of Pentecost, which is in few weeks, Peter preached to a large crowd of people. Within his sermon, he uttered these words: "But God raised him from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him." Acts 2:24.

When I read this verse, it reveals a few things to me. The words "freeing him" tell me that death is an agonizing prison. The words, "impossible... to keep its hold" tell me that death has a very strong and firm grip. Finally, the words, "God raised him" tell me that Jesus was dead but God brought him back to new and renewed life. That empty tomb is something of a marvel. It was no match for Jesus. It could not keep him. Dead is dead, but not for Jesus. Do you realize that Christianity is the only faith whose leader's burial place is empty? We serve the one who defeated death so that we do not taste it.

Judging from Peter's words here death is nothing enjoyable. Using his words it appears that death is a prison and probably not like the prison system in our country. I don't imagine death having three square meals a day, time to think, getting a job, improving your strength and having visitors. Peter says Jesus was freed from agony. It appears that death has a very firm grip that we cannot escape. It's not as if we can try it out and then decide we don't like it and choose something else. Once we're there, it's like a seatbelt that has locked itself in place when you press hard on the brake pedal. That's quite a firm grip and not one that you can get away from. Though death is a prison and has a strong grip, it's no match for God. Jesus was dead but God brought him back to life. God raised him, Peter said. God goes even further to share this freedom with us. We will not taste that agony. We will not be restrained by that strong grip. God will raise us to life too.

We have been made for eternity. Our faith is a living faith. Our savior is a living savior. We may believe dead is dead but because of Jesus, this is no longer true. Let us live into this Easter season knowing that our Savior is alive and so is our faith. Let's be surprised that he who is with us is not dead but alive.

In addition, the VBS committee, under the direction of Dan Fisher, is gearing up and getting ready for our annual summer Vacation Bible School neighborhood outreach.

But what is most exciting is that Zion will be celebrating the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its founding in 2025. According to NALC records, Zion was founded on August 25, 1800! We will celebrate the weekend of August 23-24, 2025. As is always the case in churches, **a committee has been formed** to spearhead the celebration of this historic event. # **An Easter Message from Pastor Bill, Visitation Pastor**

## Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Christ is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

This is the age-old cry Christians have been making for nearly 2000 years, ever since word first spread that death could not hold onto God's chosen One. To those of us who have grown up in the church, the Easter acclamation is as familiar as it is ancient. Yet I wonder whether we say this too easily and too quickly.

Have you ever noticed that this was not the first response of Jesus' earliest followers? In fact, whatever differences in detail the four Gospels present in their stories of Christ's cross and resurrection, they are uniform in their description that the news of Jesus' triumph over the grave was met initially not with shouts of acclamation and praise but with skepticism, doubt, and disbelief. In Luke's account, not only do the disciples dismiss the witness of the women who were greeted by angels with the news of Christ's resurrection, but even after Jesus meets them fully alive, they believed he was a ghost and continued to doubt and wonder as they were simultaneously overcome by joy.

Why was it so difficult for Jesus' earliest followers - those who knew him most intimately and had heard him speak of his death and resurrection on several occasions - to believe their own eyes? Simply because death and fear were so present in their lives that they had a hard time believing God could overcome them. In short, they were too mired in the destruction that attends the fallen creation to grasp God's wondrous act of re-creation and renewal.

Such is often the case, I would suggest, with us. Many leave the joy of Easter services only to return home to headlines about terrorism, war, difficulties in relationships at work or home, or fear for a loved one struggling with illness or addiction. And these omnipresent realities overwhelm us to the point that while we confess that Christ is risen at church, we live in the world as if he had remained in the tomb.

Which is why I wonder if we utter the words of the ancient acclamation too easily. For the cry that "Christ is Risen" is not only a confession about something that happened long ago, it is testimony to our confidence that God's love continues to transform the world, that fear should not be the dominant reality in our world, and that death is no match for the abundant life Christ brings.

In the weeks after Easter (a seven week-long season), please pause before you join your voice to those that God's love and life are stronger than hate, fear, or death. And then say those words with abandon, trusting that God continues to create light from darkness and breathe life where death once dominated.

But don't stop at church. When you watch fearsome headlines, say those words again, even out loud. And when you struggle with a relationship or worry about a loved one, repeat them to yourself. These words were not meant to only adorn our liturgy but to transform our lives. For Easter not only marks Jesus' triumph over the grave but also invites us to enter into an entirely new reality where God's grace makes all things possible, where the future is forever guaranteed, and where life and light promise to illumine even the darkest of roads.

For Christ is Risen, Alleluia! Christ is Risen indeed. Alleluia!

# **Multigenerational Packing Event for NALC Disaster Response**

Over 50 people of all ages helped join Jesus on His Mission on Palm Sunday by packing flood buckets for NALC Disaster Response during our Faith Education hour. 100 five-gallon buckets were packed with cloth gloves, leather work gloves, rubber cleaning gloves, gar-



bage bags, rags, scrub brushes, paper towels, powdered cleaner, liquid cleaner, bleach, and a prayer card. Younger children paired up with a partner that was 6th grade or older, strengthening our relationships as we worked to serve others. Additional adults handed out the items seated at their stations to assure the correct items were in each bucket and that the lids were secured. The flood buckets were picked up later that week and after making it to the national warehouse in Caldwell, OH were promptly sent to Indiana and Ohio to help victims of tornados in mid-March. This multi-generational event was made possible through Zion's Benevolence as well as a


