# A Message from Pastor Bill - Reformation 2024

October 31st is the actual day we celebrate the Protestant Reformation. The Sunday closest is "Reformation Sunday." We remember Dr. Martin Luther and what God set in motion through Luther after he nailed his 95 Theses of protest on the front door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany.

The narrative of the Protestant Reformation started twelve years before Luther made his protest against the Roman Catholic Church. It wasn't long after a near death experience that Luther found himself on the inside of the St. Augustine monastery. Luther's time as a postulate and a monk became a very dark and depressing time of spiritual despair. Reflecting later upon this time Luther said, "I lost touch with Christ the Savior and Comforter, and made Him the jailor and hangman of my poor soul." Back then, people did not find Christ, because the Gospel was not proclaimed by the Church in the purity that is found in the Word of God.


Christianity at the time was almost totally and completely void of the comfort that comes from knowing Christ as Savior. But Luther found Christ to be his Savor and Comforter as he opened the Scriptures and studied texts like the one read on Reformation Sunday – Romans 3:19-28.

By reading his Bible, Luther discovered that our salvation has absolutely nothing to do with our good works. Luther would relentlessly fast, which he later believed, permanently ruined his health. He went on a pilgrimage to Rome to grow closer to God, and it didn't work. He would go to the confessional booth and confess until he thought of every last sin, a torturous process. Luther understood that no matter how hard he tried to be a good and faithful monk, before God he was still a sinner deserving nothing but the righteous judgment of God.

It wasn't until Luther uncovered the Biblical teaching of salvation as a free gift, apart from the works of the Law, that he found Christ to be his Savior and Comforter. Until then, he never heard the good news of the Gospel.

After the revelation that God's righteousness being given is based on the merits of Christ's works alone and His atoning sacrifice upon the cross, Luther finally found his Savior and Comforter. The old chains of Law were loosed and now Luther was free to serve Christ without fear of God's righteous judgment. He could leave the altar, knowing that the body and blood of Christ present in the bread and wine had totally and completely covered every sin. Luther would now be used to spread the pure message of the Gospel!

# A Message from Pastor Mathew

Not long after we celebrate Reformation Day, we come to another special day in the church calendar. We hear a lot about All Saints' Day but we don't do very much with All Souls Day. In fact, you won't find All Souls Day in our Lutheran Calendar in our LBW. Not to be confused with All Saints Day on November 1st, All Souls Day, November 2nd, came about back in the Middle Ages and it was connected with the idea of Purgatory. People would gather for a special mass, offering prayers on behalf of loved ones who had died that they might be released from Purgatory and allowed into heaven. But, during the time of the Reformation, when the belief in indulgences and Purgatory were abolished, All Souls Day fell into the abyss along with them but All Saints remained.

In most modern Lutheran Churches, ours included, we have absorbed the function of All Souls Day into our All Saints' worship by providing an opportunity to remember the faithful departed and light candles in remembrance of their lives in Christ. We must not forget or let this overshadow the true meaning of All Saints Day as a day to remember the heroes of the faith, those in whom we get our best examples of living a faithful life like Abraham, Moses, Elijah and others. Just read Hebrews 11 to get a few examples. By fusing these two days together, we have opportunity to remember those whom we love who have died in the Lord but when those feelings of sadness well up within us, we have yet another opportunity to remember and celebrate those saints of the Bible and throughout history that have imitated Christ for us. They are the fingers that point to Christ.

This is important to us because we come to worship on All Saints' Day, each of us knowing someone we love who has died this past year. This can cause questions to well up in our hearts, questions of uncertainty. They are real questions. When those questions come, remember those fingers that point to Jesus. Remember those saints of old who have told of God and His love for us. Remember the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ given to us by his death and resurrection, the grace that breaks the bonds of death, the grace that is sufficient for every single person, the grace that promises life unending.
