A Message from Pastor Mathew

Over the past few months, I touched on some of the reasons people give for staying away from church and how we can respond when somebody gives those reasons. I'm being honest when I say we are going to hear them more and more. I share with you yet another one of those reasons and how we can respond to it. And this one might even be one you can relate to.

I hear people say, "Sunday is my only day to sleep in," and being very transparent, they are probably not wrong. Our weeks are full. They are full of school, sports, work, and appointments. I had to laugh when I was starting to write this. My daughter is in the Baldwin High School band and one of the fundraisers for the music program is hoagies. While raising funds so Skye can participate is important, I refuse to participate in this fundraiser for one reason. The parents make the hoagies on Saturday mornings before dawn and Saturdays are MY only day to sleep in. So, let me just say, I know what people mean when they're talking about sleep.

But here's the thing: grumbling about getting up to make and sell sandwiches is different than grumbling about getting up to receive grace. Hoagies feed a fundraiser. Worship feeds your soul. Hoagies build up a music program. Worship builds up your faith, your family, your foundation for life even when it doesn't feel like it. Hoagies would cost me sleep and give me a sandwich. Worship might cost me sleep but it gives me something eternal. We all need rest. That is especially true in today's culture. But sometimes, the rest we need most isn't sleep. It's remembering who we are, who God is. Church is not another thing to do. It's where you get a chance to breathe again.

Someone confessed to me not long ago they may have had their eyes closed during church. As my internship supervisor has told me and others, God still speaks to you when your eyes are closed. If this hour in church was the time your eyes got heavy and it was the only time you had to just relax, church is a good place to do it. Never doubt the Spirit's ability to reach you. Jesus tells us that when we are weary and burdened, we should go to bed. Actually, no, he didn't say that. Those are the words we put in his mouth. In reality, he says when we are weary and burdened, we should come to him for rest. Let's get some quality rest in worship this weekend.

You may have noticed some additional worship participants listed in the bulletin. In addition to the usual ushers, communion assistants, lectors, and acolytes, etc., we now list Openers/Closers, Church Sign, and Grass Cutting. Without a full-time custodian, Zion's members are serving in these areas.

Openers/Closers (both Saturday and Sunday) arrive to the church early, unlock the parking lot entrance doors and the main entrance doors on Rt. 51 and turn on all the lights both in the sanctuary and downstairs. They make sure the cross is in the proper place for that service and that there are collection plates on the altar. They also stay until everyone has left the building, making sure all lights are off, all area doors are closed, and all outside doors are locked. Please be respectful of their time and exit the church after service within a reasonable amount of time.

The Church Sign volunteers replace the message each week on our 3-sided sign board on Rt. 51. You may see them after service on Sunday or Monday morning, going in and out of the main entrance doors with handfuls of letters. If you are driving by along Brownsville or Rt. 51, give them an encouraging "honk."

The Grass Cutting volunteers, of course, cut the grass around the church, usually once a week, April through October. The main area that needs to be cut is along the Rt. 51 side. These volunteers keep our church landscape looking nice.

Each of these are important areas of service and all could use additional volunteers. Openers/Closers need to have access to a church key fob and some extra time on Saturday or Sunday before and after worship. The Church Sign volunteers give 1 to 2 hours a week for a month. Pastor Mathew provides the messages; you need to put the letters in all three sides of the sign. And finally, Grass Cutting is just what it says. There is a small electric lawnmower at the church, or you could bring your own. If you cut your grass at home, you could cut the grass at Zion.

Please prayerfully consider serving in these areas. Many hands make light work.

North American Lutheran Church (NALC) Mission Convocation

August 3-8. 2025 Omni William Penn Hotel Pittsburgh By Pastor Bill



This convocation celebrated a defining milestone in the life of NALC: 15 years of faithful ministry and mission and 10 years of theological formation through the North American Lutheran Seminary (NALS). Centered on the theme "Running with Endurance: Fixing our Eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 12), the week brought worship, learning and fellowship through the many events and the Mission Convocation itself.

Below list some events and highlights:

Lutheran Theologians for the Church: 4 theological papers were delivered and discussed.

Faith Formation Festival Topics: Music in Christian Education, Special Needs Ministry, Youth Ministry in the 21st Century

Vacation Bible School: Offered to parents who brought their children.

WNALC (Women of the NALC): The Reverend Patti Morlock was the guest speaker and 7 dedicated women were elected the WNALC Executive Council.

Tour of the North American Lutheran Seminary: Shuttle tour offered.

Braaten-Benne Lectures in Theology: This year's lectures focused on the vital intersection of mission and apologetics. In our culture that is increasingly skeptical of the Gospel, the lectures explored the New Testament's understanding of the "world" on one hand, the necessary renunciation of the world as the domain of sin and the devil (John 12:31; 14:30; 1 John 5:19) and on the other, God's deep love for His creation and His redemptive mission within it (John 3:16-17). Attendees were invited to discover how the Church can faithfully stand against the spirit of the age while still engaging the world for the sake of the Gospel always with eyes fixed on Jesus and hearts rooted in His truth.

Break-out Sessions: Valuable information was provided about NALC resources (NALS, Raising Pastors in the Congregation, Life-to-Life Discipleship, Stewardship, Church Planting, World Missions and Youth Ministry.

Elections and Business Meeting: The results of the election of the Executive Council, NALS Board of Regents and the Court of Adjudication can be found at the website above.

Our Task: We will receive the full text of the approved amendments along with instructions for the ratification process. To be ratified, at least half of NALC congregations must participate in the vote, and two-thirds must vote in favor. Congregations will have 6 months to hold a congregational meeting and report their vote.

Worship: Worship was vibrant and sermons delivered by The Reverend Dr. Dan Selbo, Bishop of NALC and The Reverend Dr. Jukka Kääriäinen, new President of NALS were compelling.

Zion Presence: Zion was well represented at the convocation with the official voting delegates, volunteers, presenters and worship leaders. Pastor Mathew (clergy, volunteer), Lane Magera (delegate, Zion Volunteer Coordinator, WNALC delegate, Mission District Volunteer Planning Committee), Jon Galland (delegate), Sherry Galland (delegate), Dr. Alex Pierce (theologian, Braaten-Beene lecturer), Dr David Luy (theologian). In addition to those listed above the following Zion members served as volunteers (Vicky Thatcher, John Thatcher, Laurie Miller, Anita Reck, Jack Reck and John Reed). Cassandra Pierce, Karen Stoddart and Sherry Galland attended the WNALC gathering. Lastly, Zion's musicians produced many joyful noises during worship; keyboardist (Sherry Galland), brass and percussion group (Pastor Mathew, Dr. David Luy, Joe Robinson and Cassie Robinson). **A heartfelt thanks to Zion members who gave of their time to assure a successful convocation in our home town.**



SERVANTS NEEDED

ALTAR GUILD

A special thanks to Mary Severson, Charlanne Ammon and Dani Richey who have faithfully served the Lord and Zion for many years as Altar Guild members.

The Altar Guild serves the Lord and Zion by preparing the altar for communion each week. Currently, we have 3.5 teams, with one of these teams being a husband and wife team. We are praying that the Holy Spirit will stir 3 persons' hearts to join the Altar Guild before this fall to allow for training new members prior to January 1, 2026.

The Altar Guild works in teams of 2. The team decides if they want to work together for each task or divide the tasks. The rotation depends upon the number of teams. At this time, the rotation is 2 weeks out of every 8 weeks. It takes on average 1 hour to set up communion at a time chosen by your team, 5 minutes between services to replenish as needed and 15 minutes after Sunday service to put away the ciboriums and chalices and clean-up. On occasion the teams may have to set up during the week for a funeral or wedding. The teams are great with trading weeks with each other or covering for each other as needed.

KITCHEN COORDINATOR

Starting November 1, Zion will need someone to serve as the coordinator for the Kitchen Ministry. Responsibilities include making sure there are enough helpers for any church-sponsored event, checking food inventory for expiration dates, helping, and setting up for Lenten Meals, Saturday Night Cookouts, and various other events on the church calendar. The coordinator does not need to be at all these events, but makes sure there are volunteers willing to facilitate set up and clean up activities. Responsibilities also include making sure the kitchen is neat, and all materials are in their correct places. The kitchen is currently well organized, and the coordinator is someone who can continue this particularly important task. We currently have someone who has accepted the responsibility of ordering supplies for the kitchen through the church office, but is not available many months to coordinate the overall Kitchen Ministry.
